

Dr. Sanders teaches courses on Catholic Studies, drawing upon her background in philosophy and theology along with her love of literature, film, and Dr. Martin Luther King. Her role also includes contributing to forming students in the riches of the Ignatian tradition and facilitating the integration of intellectual formation with social, moral and spiritual formation.

PRESENTATION: Meeting Historical Decline with Christian Hope: Ignatius, Lonergan, and Spiritual Conversations

What does Christian hope have to do with our secular age and how can it meet the problem of the longer cycle of decline? Christian hope is essential to navigating this moment in human history because it counters the despair, determinism, and desolation that permeate our felt-sense of historical decline and derail recovery. Bernard Lonergan's theological response to historical decline foregrounds the centrality of the theological virtues. This paper advances Lonergan's understanding the third differential of history (recovery) by elaborating upon hope, while also proposing spiritual practices to cultivate an increase in hope.
